The Refinery never sleeps. The hum-drum of its throbbing presence is unique to its life design as an organism pulsating to fuel the future.

Amid COVID 19, several equations are under check to ensure the product lines are aflush, from steady production to safe operations, from protection of its workforce to preparations for planned shutdowns.

Yes, the Refinery never sleeps.

WHEN THE REFINERY GATES PEN FOR PLANT SHUTDOWN

At the very outset I would like to congratulate team Kochi Refinery for adapting to the mission mode instantly and accepting the reality of COVID 19 in no time. We know that for any shutdown, the activities are challenging even under planned or normal circumstances. This time around, the challenges are multi-fold; opening up an entirely different experience with a new kind of checklist to think and act from. My special for probing all sides, going the extra-mile to understand the challenges rules and SOPs of COVID 19 health and safety mandates.

WHAT WE ORIGINALLY PLANNED:

required specialists, thus adding another 150 to the man-power count. The entire work envisaged in 14 days was to the tune of Rs.50 Crores.

AND THE WAY THINGS TURNED:

The Covid-19 pandemic capsized our entire shutdown plan. Mobilizing manpower and material from different parts of India came to a total halt and we had to come-up with an alternate strategy for seeing this through without compromising on safety and plant reliability.

An alternate contract agency was not available locally for the Catalyst replacement, hence the entire crew of 150 workers were brought in from Karnataka and placed under mandatory quarantine of 14 days before the catalyst replacement schedule is taken on board.

With several limitations at hand, the scope of the LSTK was changed to mini-packages for the specific VGOHDS/DHDS jobs in such a way that manpower and resources utilization could be planned differently tapping mainly from local resources. Advisory Services and Manufacturing department also revised the scope of work in line with priority-wise release of equipment. Execution of the intermediate tube sheet replacement in VGO Fractionator Heater got converted to limited manpower job on 12 Hr Shift. Thinking on the feet and fine tuning the balancing act, each job required care, caution and precise planning to now meet the unchanged deadline of 31 May 2020.

MAJOR CHALLENGES

Mobilization of Manpower was one of the most challenging experience for us. Around 150 workers had to be brought in from Mangalore, Karnataka to our Refinery, which requires crossing the borders of several districts and two States. With the active support of our Public Relations, HR and Mangalore LPG and Calicut Retail teams, we received

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all necessary approvals from various statutory bodies for transportation and mandatory quarantine stay for the work-force. Food and accommodation has been arranged for them near the Refinery. In addition to awareness sessions and health checks, all of them had also to undergo the COVID check as per the protocol developed for the final fitness approval to join the Refinery team for the shut-down jobs.

Executing jobs with limited manpower is equally challenging when posed with critical criteria like time and quality. Moreover, the responsibility vested in us, is not only completing the jobs, but managing and controlling safe operations through the people engaged externally for the shutdown of VGOHDS/DHDS. We have to look acutely into the sustained adherence to personal hygiene, social distancing and other COVID related precautionary measures at site by our team members and those who have been brought in for the specialized jobs.

HIGH POINTS OF LEARNING

The COVID 19 pandemic has opened the entire world to look at things in a totally new way. For the size and nature of the job at our hand, the transportation of the manpower, 150 people, from Mangalore was the toughest of them all. Convincing the local bodies and the police, mobilizing contract manpower from interiors of Mangalore and regular follow up with different agencies, team BPCL has shown its resilience and persistence to face every challenge and abide by all norms for bringing the entire contract team to Kochi safely.

We are also relying heavily on digital technology for relaying the catalyst replacement activities to the suppliers via real-time live-streaming. As international lockdown has restricted travel to India, catalyst suppliers UOP and Albemarle will monitor the onsite process from their home-locations through the live-streaming, our first time for such a process.

It builds confidence in us that we are progressing as scheduled with the safe execution of mini-package shutdown with limited manpower, resources and observing all COVID -HSE guidelines.

I would also like to compliment the MSBP and PDPP teams for having all the checks and balances in place for coming back into full-stream as soon as the lockdown was relaxed in Kerala in the last week of April 2020. I appreciate the extent to which care is being taken for ensuring the safety of every person entering the project sites.

In the coming days, safety at work and safety of man-power is quintessential at all levels and at all sites. It becomes our primary responsibility to be safe and to re-remind everyone around us - employees and contract labour on the importance of wearing masks and maintaining social distancing for the best interest of oneself, our families, for our company and for our country.

As Martin Luther King said, the ultimate measures of a man is not whether he stands in moments of comfort and convenience, but where he stands at times of challenge and controversy. BPCL Kochi Refinery has proved once again that we are born to be challenged and to deliver passionately.

For, to us the call of duty, is the highest call of them all.

PROJECTS IN FULL SWING AT KOCHI REFINERY

All guidelines on safety and health are in place at the MSBP & PDPP, two major project sites at Kochi Refinery where works have resumed after recent relaxation of lock-down in Kerala for construction works. At these labour intensive sites, Kochi Refinery is maintaining strict protocols on Social Distancing, work readiness, personal hygiene and COVID awareness among the migrant labour and contract labour engaged at site.

Thermal scanning is compulsory at all Labour entry gates and those found unfit are not permitted to work. Public announcements are also being made on COVID awareness for the labour force to work stressfree and without panic.

As the nation is continuing the lockdown to combat Covid- 19 virus concerns, it has become all the more imperative that we meticulously follow the standard operating norms (SOPs) and the Government guidelines issued from time to time on containment of Covid Virus.

The travel operations through trains/ flights have resumed with certain restrictions. In the recent guideline issued by HR Department, it has been reiterated that people travelling from other districts within Kerala or from other states in India have to intimate the Occupation Health Centre and obtain necessary information on protocols to be followed before undertaking such inter-district or inter-state journey. Similarly people travelling from COVID affected zones, area, district or state and the employees who come in contact with them have to remain in isolation as per the Guidelines. These employees are required to provide data of movement of the people residing with them to OHC.

Before Putting on a Mask:


Clean hands with alcohol-based hand rub or soap and water.




While Wearing a Mask:

- 1. Cover your mouth and nose. Make sure there are no gaps between your face and the mask.
- 2. Avoid touching the mask. If you do, clean your hands with alcoholbased hand rub or soap and water.
- 3. Replace the mask with a new one as soon as it is damp. Do not re-use single-use masks.

Masks are effective only when used in combination with frequent hand-cleaning with alcohol-based hand rub or soap and water.



- 1. Remove the mask from behind using the strings. Do not touch the front of mask.
- 2. Discard the mask immediately in a closed bin.
- 3. Clean hands with alcoholbased hand rub or soap and
